## Strategies that work in ALL subject areas

- HOMEWORK IS ESSENTIAL TO SUCCESS
  - Do your homework on time, every time!
  - Ask questions as you review it!
  - Highlight or mark your mistakes.
  - Follow up by asking questions.

## Strategies that work in ALL subject areas

#### TAKE NOTES

- Ask questions as you go!
- Use your notes to help you complete homework correctly.
- Ask a strong peer or the teacher for a copy of the notes if you think you missed important information.

## Strategies that work in ALL subject areas

#### • A COUPLE DAYS BEFORE THE TEST

- Study your notes by writing a series of questions that will test your understanding.
- Make flashcards to study the important stuff!
- Review Homework assignments & supporting materials
- Attend open lunch to get question answered.

## Study Strategies for math

#### PRACTICE LIKE YOU PLAY

- Re-do problems from your homework and/or lessons that you found challenging the first time.
- o 20 minutes of practice every day will be a big help!
- Visit your math teacher at Open Lunch to ask specific questions.

# Study Strategies for math

- PRACTICE LIKE YOU PLAY
  - Attend Math Homework Help before/after school.
  - Work with a friend who is <u>serious</u> about improvement.

# Study Strategies for math

#### • BEFORE THE TEST

- Review the Module especially the Module Review. (These questions will be similar to what is on the test.)
- Complete the practice test on time so you can participate in the in-class review. (Highlight answers you miss, so you remember to ask questions.)
- Attend any available study sessions.

# Study Strategies for English

- DAILY EFFORTS
  - Do the reading!
  - Annotate texts & review annotations to study
  - Participate in discussions about homework. (This is a great opportunity to learn from mistakes.)
  - Go in during open lunch for help.

# Study Strategies for English

#### TAKE GOOD NOTES

- If yours are missing information, reach out to a strong peer or teacher for complete notes.
- Review notes and/ or flashcards. For literary terms, think of examples from the text your class is reading.
- Use quizlet when available.
